Provide intensive and structured psychosocial recovery services, including individual and group therapy. Collaborate closely with psychiatrists, case managers, nurses, and staff from other crisis stabilization units to ensure coordinated, trauma-informed care and continuity of services throughout the client's recovery process

- Facilitate drafting viable safety plans for clients not meeting legal criteria for involuntary holds
- Seek psychiatric inpatient placement for individuals meeting criteria for involuntary holds
- Respond to law enforcement dispatch requesting mental health evaluations and provide mental health and substance use resource referrals for individuals not meeting criteria for involuntary holds
- Ride in assigned Modesto City Police patrol vehicles to respond to 911 mental health crisis calls
- File mandated reports as needed to Child and Adult Protective Services and law enforcement
- Collaborate with emergency room and inpatient facility doctors, nurses, law enforcement, and other physical and mental health professionals to advance client care
- Respect client confidentiality and needs in a crisis response context
